

# President's Cup Preview

The [Presidents Cup](#) is a golf tournament happening every odd year between the United States versus the rest of the world minus Europe. Europe gets their very own chance in a much older tournament called the [Ryder Cup](#), which happens every even year. The Presidents Cup was invented in 1994, and has had twelve events since its inauguration. The United States has won an astounding ten events, losing one, and tying the other.

























The 2019 Presidents Cup is unique, because arguably the greatest player to ever play the sport is the captain of the American team, Captain Tiger Woods. If that wasn't crazy enough, Woods is also playing in the tournament, as he selected himself as one of his four captain picks.

The other three captain picks included: Tony Finau, Patrick Reed (2018 Masters winner), and Gary Woodland (2019 US Open winner). Others who just missed the cut were players like Rickie Fowler and Kevin Na. I believe the decision came down to the World Rankings more than anything else. Tiger (7th), Woodland (15th), Reed (16th), Finau (17th), Fowler (21st), and Kevin Na (26th). Based off of those numbers alone, I believe that was the exact model Tiger followed when using his picks. I don't necessarily fault him, as the rankings should definitely hold some merit in the decision process, and I'm sure he didn't pick just solely off the list, but it definitely played the biggest role in my opinion.

Tiger selecting himself was met with different thoughts around the golfing community since he is a Captain this year. While I had no issue with his choice, John Feinstein at Golf Digest had some great reasons as to why he shouldn't have, [here](#). Despite John's great points, I had no issue with Tiger's choice, for the same reason NBC had no problem with his decision. NBC will be airing the Presidents Cup, and since Tiger Woods is the most popular and polarizing golfer on the planet, they were happy to hear that he would be competing, guaranteeing them a better rating, as opposed to him just sitting on the sidelines. I was also excited he picked himself, because as a fan of golf, Tiger Woods playing and competing in an event, is going to give the event more meaning and attention as opposed to him just being the Captain of the US team. Him calling the shots as Captain wouldn't be enough to get the masses to watch the event, especially during the NFL season. However, with Tiger playing in the event too, more people will be inclined to tune in.

Besides making the event bigger by playing in it, Tiger has also earned the opportunity with his recent play. You could have made the case for Rickie Fowler (more on him later), or Kevin Na who were both listed as possible candidates, but Tiger just recently won the ZoZo Championship in China, which by the way, was his 81st career win on the PGA Tour. So despite the fact that he not only is the most popular and decorated golfer of his time, but his current form is still worthy of being one of the top 12 U.S. players. The world rankings say this, and so does the eye test.

Brooks Koepka, who was one of the eight qualifiers on the U.S. side and the number 1 ranked player in the world, has withdrawn from the tournament due to a knee injury. Rickie Fowler has taken his place, one of the players whom Tiger passed on to pick himself as one of his captain picks. Barring any more late changes due to injury, the twelve man teams are finally set.
